Collective behavior refers to noninstitutionalized activity in which several or many people voluntarily engage. Examples range from flash mobs to commuters riding the bus together to a group of teens adopting a favorite singer's hairstyle. Early collective behavior theories focused on the irrationality of crowds, but eventually those were supplanted by more sophisticated models that [PSY 250 Week 2 Psychoanalytic Personality](#) crowds as organized groups of logical beings.

The immediate effect of all kinds of collective behaviour is to change the salience of various problems, issues, and groups in public awareness. For example, disarmament became an important issue when anti-nuclear demonstrations took place; fads draw attention to recreational activities; and panics monopolize public concern.

How these immediate effects translate into long-term consequences depends upon several contingencies, of which four merit particular attention. First, the reaction of authorities plays an important role in the process: alarmed reactions strengthen polarizations; repressive reactions reinforce social control; moderate reactions facilitate mediation viewpoints; and inaction or ineffectual action enhances attempts to usurp authority.

## Case Study

The term collective behavior is often used by sociologists to refer to miscellaneous, unexpected, dramatic events that engulf large numbers of persons. The most common examples are crowds, fads, panics and social movements. College catalogs usually list this [SOC 315 Week 3 Cultural Heritage Traditions](#) as involving the study of crowds, mobs and masses, but they rarely define what is meant by these nouns. Words such as sudden, cataclysmic, volatile and unscheduled may be used to describe the events that sociologists call collective behavior; however, these adjectives can also be misleading.

These events do not always involve crowds, masses or fads; they can occur within formal organizations as well. For example, a group of employees reacting to a problem in their work setting or a neighborhood might organize a boycott to protest a decision by management. This is a form of collective behavior, and its effects may be similar to those of other types of collective [nurs-fpx 4900 assessment 4](#).

Collective behavior can evoke the most laudable as well as the most dreaded of human qualities. It can lead to reform, challenge of unjust authority and renewal. It can also spawn destruction, irrationality and barbarism. It is a subject of fascination and debate in every society.

Sociologists are [NSG456 Week 5 Assessment Research Dissemination Plan](#) with the ways in which persons respond to each other, to their environment and to cultural influences. Collective behavior is a major area of interest because it provides a window into the underlying dynamics of society.

Earlier theorists (some of whom were unduly captivated by the ephemeral, spontaneous, populist, excitable and exciting characteristics of collective behavior) went too far in separating it from conventional or organizational behavior. They also tended to deny, or ignore, the many ways in which structure and process are intertwined. Some of the recent theorists have tried to take a more [PSYCH 655 Week 6 Mental Health Assessments and Cultural Considerations](#) view and have made greater allowance for the ways in which organizational behavior is a critical aspect of

collective behavior.
